V. Efforts Taken to Stay Current

A: Field

As a teacher and interdisciplinary scholar, I stay current in the fields of Sociology and Ethnic Studies –with a specific emphasis on Asian American Studies. I stay updated in a number of ways:

- Serving on book and article award committees where I read recent publications in the field
- Extensively read latest books on race and equity including "How to be an Anti-racist, by Ibram Kendi;" "Professional Troublemaker, by Luvvie Ajayi Jones;" "Minor Feelings: an Asian American Reckoning, by Cathy Park;" and, "We Want to Do More than Survive, by Bettina Love."
- Attending the conferences of the American Sociological Association, Pacific Sociological Association and the American Studies Association multiple times during the review cycle.

These conferences and reading the latest publications in the field help me diversify the content of my syllabi, and allow me to integrate important, timely materials that reflect the life experiences of my students.

B: Assignment

In addition to readings, I attended workshops that diversified my classroom pedagogical strategies. I focused specifically on learning about technological tools and pedagogical tools I could use to increase high-touch relational practices for students in my online classes. This included learning platforms such as:

I also utilized new resources for teaching race and ethnicity put together by sources like the New York Times, the National African American History Museum, and Teaching Tolerance

Future Directions

A: Assessment

Over the last four years, my work demonstrates a commitment to community, students, and the college. I've contributed to all areas of SCC and Los Rios. Arguably, I should say 'no' more often. That said, I'm incredibly proud of my record of service on behalf of my faculty colleagues and students. The success of my efforts is demonstrated through student reviews, ongoing mentoring relationships with students, and recognition from my peers and the community. This past year I was recognized by my colleagues with the SCC Excellence Award in Fall 2022. I also received a teaching recognition from Fuego FM/ La TriColore Radio.

I concentrate my efforts on strengthening my equity work. I work with colleagues, particularly in counseling, that help me improve my ability to work relationally with students. While my equity scores for DI populations tend to vacillate from semester semester—I know that these descriptive statistics fail to identify that my partnership with Puente, RISE, EOP, UMOJA and even athletics often mean I teach some of our most vulnerable students in high numbers, which makes equity work increasingly important. I remain committed to finding ways to meet students where they're at and help them complete their educational goals.

Goals:

Moving fully online amidst COVID-19 presented unique challenges with student engagement and success. Although I taught online prior to the pandemic, I find that my students are now often overwhelmed with the requirements of a fully online academic schedule. As an instructor that opted to return to in person teaching in Spring 2022, I realize that my students' needs are much more diverse than they were before. I am witnessing higher levels of anxiety, confusion over college classroom life, but also the real desire to connect. My goal is to continue to improve my online classes, and work to meet the new mental health needs of our students.

Resources:

I believe the College and District need to build a more robust infrastructure on advancing equity. The offerings tend to be one dimensional and fail to adequately provide more advanced and nuanced trainings that help intermediate and advanced equity practitioners.
